LIGHTNING TALK: Understanding 'attention-seeking' behaviour: What's really going on?

Trusting adults and directly cuing them about their needs for support is something that many children with trauma have great difficulty with. This often results in them connecting with adults in ways that is commonly mistaken as 'attention-seeking'. These behaviours can be challenging to manage, particularly in an OSHC setting where children's needs are so diverse.

Kicking off the Lightning Talks, Trent will provide educators with his framework for reinterpreting 'attention-seeking' through an attachment lens. He will also walk through applying the framework practically, guiding educators' responses to 'attention-seeking' and helping them understand how to reduce the frequency and intensity of occurrences.

He rejects what he calls the 'major problems' of the 21st century – unhealthy obsessions with rules, neatness and material possessions – that limit children's lives. You'll be inspired by his passion for programs that enable risk, adventure and the freedom of each child's inner person.

BREAKOUT 1: Understanding child mental health and childhood bullying

Emerging Minds

Bullying is a common childhood experience. However, it is not 'a normal part of growing up' nor is it 'just something kids do'. The effects of bullying on child mental health and wellbeing can be significant, both for those being bullied and those engaging in bullying behaviour. Children who engage in bullying behaviour are often doing so as a response to their environment, which can include challenges at home such as family and domestic violence or poverty.

All OSHC professionals share the responsibility of keeping an eye on bullying at their services and having the confidence to respond to and prevent it. Attendees of this session will take several practical strategies back to their service, including increased confidence to spot signs of bullying, what to do when it occurs, and how to have impactful conversations about bullying with children, families and colleagues.

BREAKOUT 2: OSHC Professional Standards for Management and Leadership

Chief Executive Officer – Queensland Children's Activities Network (QCAN)

Attention all OSHC managers and leaders (both present and future!) – would you like to enhance your OSHC leadership skills with advice from one of OSHC's most respected professionals?

Kylie will explore the Professional Standards for Management and Leadership via real case studies relevant to each of the seven standards. 
BREAKOUT 4: eSafety knowledge in OSHC

CEO and Founder – Body Safety Australia

The fast pace of new technologies emerging has both its benefits and challenges in OSHC. Unfortunately, children aged between nine and twelve are in the most vulnerable cohort for technology-based child sexual exploitation. Additionally, children are using the internet to explore sex, relationships and sexuality. Often their exploration leads to them viewing pornography, which can dramatically skew their idea of safe and healthy sex.

This session is a must-do for educators wanting to understand how to navigate internet use with children as they mature and how to look for the (not so obvious) warning signs when something isn't right.

KEYNOTE SPEAKERS



Eddie Betts

AFL legend, children's author, and Founder/Director - Eddie Betts Foundation

Eddie – a Gubrun, Wirangu and Kokatha man – is one of Australia's most decorated sporting champions. Though Eddie's story is one of great success, his journey to the top of the game wasn't easy. Behind the scenes, he faced years of racism and discrimination. These experiences are what inspired him to start the Eddie Betts Foundation – a not-for-profit with the goal of helping First Nations youth overcome the barriers between them and their goals. So far, the foundation has started a basketball program, a football academy, an educational program, a community program and a mentoring program. At the OSHC Conference, Eddie will share his remarkable journey so far, empowering and inspiring educators to feel confident supporting children to realise that nothing is impossible.



Associate Professor Corey Tutt OAM

Author and Founder/CEO - DeadlyScience

As a child, proud G/Kamilaroi man Corey always dreamed of becoming a zookeeper, but in high school, he developed a love of STEM subjects. However, he soon discovered that there was very little encouragement for Aboriginal people to pursue careers in STEM. In 2018, while working as a university research assistant, Corey founded DeadlyScience. DeadlyScience is a not-for-profit organisation that aims to provide science books, telescopes and other resources to remote schools in Australia and to connect young Indigenous people with mentors to encourage their participation in STEM subjects.

In 2020, Corey was named the NSW Young Australian of the Year and a Human Rights Hero by the Australian Human Rights Commission. In 2021, DeadlyScience received the Australian Museum Eureka STEM Inclusion Prize, and in 2022 Corey received the Medal of the Order of Australia. His work through DeadlyScience has also attracted international attention, with Corey presenting at both Harvard and Oxford University. In 2024 and beyond, he will continue to work tirelessly to further the work of DeadlyScience and to show First Nations children that STEM is for them.



KEYNOTE SPEAKERS



John Marsden

Globally-acclaimed author and Principal – Alice Miller School

John Marsden is known internationally for his success as an author, perhaps most so for the *Tomorrow* series. Altogether, he has written and edited over forty books and his work has been translated into eleven different languages. From the time John was a student himself, he was thinking about how education should be done differently. One of the things that struck him most was the alienation between educators and students. After he finished school, John worked in many different jobs before arriving at teaching in his late 20s. His career in the classroom – where he noticed the lack of appealing literature for adolescents – inspired him to begin to write himself.

In 2006, John started Candlebark School, an alternative primary school in the Macedon Ranges where he is also the principal. He has since expanded and added an additional campus – Alice Miller for P-12. Both schools fall under the name Alice Miller School, with Candlebark catering for P-7. John's approach to education differs from a regular curriculum and his learning is creative, lively and purposefully challenging. He is a keen advocate for children 'getting their hands dirty', both literally and metaphorically. Candlebark School prides itself on its phenomenal success in graduating adventurous young people who possess authentic inner strength without an unhealthy obsession with matters like rules, neatness and material possessions.

Dr Bruce Hurst (he/him)

Award-winning OSHC researcher

Bruce is a research fellow at the Melbourne Graduate School of Education at the University of Melbourne. He has worked in and with school-age programs for 25+ years and is one of a small number of researchers specialising in OSHC. Bruce's award-winning research has provided new ways of understanding the experiences of older primary children in OSHC. He is also the deputy chair of Community Child Care Association.



Caitlin Mason (she/her)

Professional Support Consultant - Community Child Care Association

Caitlin uses her background in early education and studies in psychology to help leaders build strong teams and meet the needs of all educators. Prior to assuming her role as a consultant, Caitlin worked as an Inclusion Professional for over ten years and previously as an educator in long day care and OSHC for 9 years.

Jennifer's research contributes to the professionalisation of the OSHC workforce, and she works closely with state governments and peak associations to deepen the understanding of school-age education and care in Australia.
